From the President: 2025 - A vintage year!

U3A Wellington City Incorporated 2025 – What a vintage year! We started with a membership of 1,348 and ended with 1,514 members, an over 11% increase. How has this been achieved?

One factor has been **the calibre of the lectures**. Attendance has hovered around 300 per lecture in all four terms. Two presentations stand out this term – Michael Baker on Lessons learned from Covid-19 and Suzanne Snively on Defusing what the Treasury describes as the Timebomb of an Aging Population. Both drew audiences of well over 400 and on both occasions the queue stretched from the sign-in desk on the first floor out the front door of the Embassy Theatre along Kent Terrace to Majoribanks Street. Well done Lecture Programme Team!

The second contributor to this increase in numbers has been the blossoming of our **Special Interest Groups** (**SIGs**). Facilitator Demetra Kennedy has set up five new SIGs, with more planned.. The inventory of all the equipment is up to date and a check has been made to ensure that all participants are paid-up members of U3A Wellington City. Well done Demetra and all SIG coordinators!

The third factor in the success of U3A Wellington City is the contribution made by **you**, **the membership**. Both Michael and Suzanne mentioned the amazing calibre of your questions in the Q & A sessions. Also, the way in which you have embraced the spirit of U3A that the Committee has tried to create – learning, having fun and sharing time with like-minded people.

More than 70 people were invited to what has become an annual event - the lunch to thank those who underpin volunteers ongoing success of U3A Wellington City activities. As President Bruce Levick said, the event held after the last lecture of the year, is a chance to acknowledge and thank volunteers for their essential contributions.

It is also a chance to put a face to a name you've seen somewhere or



find a connection with someone you've seen briefly when they scan your membership card. And as longtime volunteer **Doug Helps** said, it is also a chance to thank Bruce for his leadership and excellent lecture summaries.

The 12-person elected Committee members have portfolios including the lecture programme, events, SIGs, the website and the newsletter. They are at the hub of a much larger wheel that keeps activities running smoothly.

Thirty-one different people coordinate one or more Special Interest Groups. The two Email Coordinators send the weekly lecture updates and other essential information; on lecture days, the Front of House team welcomes and checks in members and guests, the Lecture Set-up team ensures you can see and hear the presentation, and the (very fit) Microphone Runners coordinate questions.

If you've joined fellow U3A members on a bus odyssey around scenic Wellington or ventured to Foxton to greet the godwits arriving from Alaska, you know to thank **Sue Dale** for setting it all up. If you're amongst the groups that gather for monthly Sunday roasts, the same person organised them. (Such was the merriment amongst the 25 happy diners at the pre-Christmas event at The Grand that no-one remembered to take photos.)

Since she joined the Committee in 2021, Sue, events@u3awellingtoncity.org.nz, has set up interesting experiences for some 2000 U3A members. They have gone to art and museum exhibitions, getting a close-up curator view of special displays. Eighty people visited the World Press photography show with U3A, while over 100 went to Mana Island – and some are still waiting to go next year.

Sue, who was also the organiser for the recent volunteer luncheon, will take a break over Christmas. However, she will take enquiries for a trip on **Thursday 26 February** to *King Lear* by the Butterfly Creek Theatre Troupe in Eastbourne.

Zealandia discoveries in the rain



The unscheduled early arrival of drizzle was not enough to put off the 17 U3A members and one guest who gathered to walk some lesser-known tracks of Zealandia. These included half of the Valley View Track, via the Tieke Track, the Fantail and Pylon Tracks and the Round the Lake Track.

Some members reported they were travelling on tracks they had never tried before, and others saw birds they hadn't seen before, **Liz Martin** said. A highlight was a sighting of the rare Kohurangi or Kirk's daisy in flower in the Heritage Discovery Area.
